MFL Curriculum Statement

'A high-quality languages education should foster pupils' curiosity and deepen their understanding of the world. The teaching should enable pupils to express their ideas and thoughts in another language and to understand and respond to its speakers, both in speech and in writing.' (National Curriculum 2014)

The intention of the French curriculum at Chulmleigh Academy Trust is that children are taught to develop an interest in learning other languages in a way that is enjoyable and stimulating. We encourage children's confidence, we strive to stimulate and encourage children's curiosity about language and actively plan links to develop their awareness of cultural differences in other countries, through our protected characteristics, British values and curriculum enrichment opportunities. We strive to embed the skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing necessary to enable children to use and apply their French learning in a variety of contexts and lay the foundations for future language learning.

We teach French across Key Stage 2 and have clear progression across each year grouped mapped on our knowledge organisers. A variety of the following techniques are used to encourage children to have an active engagement with French:

- Games in order to develop vocabulary through repetition, reading, writing, speaking and listening skills.
- Role-play these should relate to the situations the children may find themselves in the future.
- Action songs and rhymes to develop phonetic skills, memory skills and to further vocabulary.
- Reading and writing quality materials.
- ICT programs and websites; Dualingo is an ICT program used across the Trust.

Through the high quality teaching of French taking place we will see the impact of the subject in the following ways:

- Children will be able to communicate with each other in French.
- Children will become aware that a language has a structure, and that the structure differs from one language to another.
- Children will develop their language through development of the four key skills of speaking, listening, reading and writing.
- Children will enrich their language learning by developing an understanding of the French culture.

Children will transfer to KS3 effectively and successfully and will be well prepared to continue and develop their language skills.
