Safeguarding Updates – Director Safeguarding Visit

A few weeks ago, our Director for safeguarding visited the school and I was sent her report on the 23rd May. During her visit, she met with myself, observed an assembly, scrutinised safeguarding paperwork, our Single Central record, record keeping, our safeguarding audit and action plan, spoke to members of staff and most importantly spoke to the children about their understanding of how we help to keep them safe. What did you learn? *

The Head of School has a robust safeguarding system in place at Chulmleigh Primary school, clear evidence of effective staff training which is regularly updated, SCR is regularly reviewed by both head of school and administrative staff at the school. Children and parents are provided with regular safeguarding updates and information.

What strengths did you identify? *

Head of school is clear on the importance of safeguarding and on chatting with pupils and staff it is clear that Chulmleigh Primary school is both a safe place to work and learn, and strives to provide a safe space for all who are there. The head of school is also conscious of the external demands that families face and is supporting families in our community to help the most vulnerable students in the school community.

Suggestion Actions: *

With regards safeguarding I can find no further suggestions for the Head of school as I have observed a clearly robust system in place.

What pleases me most from the report is the fact that the children know how they are kept safe and know what to do if they ever have any concerns. However, we certainly will not become complacent as we know that there is always something that can be improved and developed.

School Improvement Update – Picture News

As a school, we have recently signed up to Picture News to give us more resources during class discussion to help promote our Oracy skills and to create engaging and exciting lessons, allowing opportunities for children to learn about our world, develop independence, resilience, respect and unlock their own drive and passion for learning. Teaching the children about the news not only provides great content and stimulus and grips children's attention, it is also something that the children can impact. It is current, happening now and so their voice is given meaning and purpose. Using Picture News in class and assembly allows the children to encourage their voice even more and to use it to impact things they are inspired by or feel passionately about.

Below are some recent examples that the children have been discussing.

Should everyone be allowed to lead a private life?

8th April 2024

This pack explored privacy in light of recent health news from the Royal Family, including King Charles III and Catherine, the Princess of Wales. This led to wider discussions of the Royal Family's roles and why we may want, or need, privacy.

What does art mean to you?

15th April 2024

Banksy's latest artwork was the pack's focus. This inspired exploration of Banksy's previous artwork that he has shared with the public, alongside discussion of different types of art and how it can have different meanings to us all.

How can shops make sure everyone feels represented?

29th April 2024

Paralympian, Stef Reid MBE, has been in the news after asking Nike to sell individual running shoes for single-leg amputees like her. This pack explored Stef Reid's request, other companies that have made inclusive changes, and how we can be the same as and different from each other.

Can the past help us learn about modern life?

6th May 2024

For this pack, we were looking back in time, following a recent study on Neanderthals that found they may have organised their living spaces in a similar way to us. This prompted deeper thoughts about how Neanderthals experienced the world, and how we can learn from the past.

Attendance Updates

As you are aware, our Trust has an unwavering commitment to improve attendance and punctuality at school as we know what a difference it makes to the children's attainment and progress. I have spoken to many parents recently and conducted supportive attendance meetings explaining how we have to follow the guidelines from the Government's 'Working together to improve school attendance' publication. The guidance focuses on the link between absence and attainment at the end of key stage 2 (KS2) and key stage 4 (KS4). Their findings concluded that:

- Pupils with higher attainment at KS2 and KS4 had lower levels of absence over the key stage compared to those with lower attainment.
- Pupils who did not achieve the expected standard in reading, writing and maths in had an overall absence rate of 4.7% over the key stage, compared with 3.5% among pupils who achieved the expected standard and 2.7% among those who achieved the higher standard.
- Pupils who did not achieve grade 9 to 4 in English and maths GCSEs had an overall absence rate of 8.8% over the key stage, compared with 5.2% among pupils who achieved a grade 4 and 3.7% among pupils who achieved grade 9 to 5 in both English and maths.
- Generally, the higher the percentage of sessions missed across the key stage at KS2 and KS4, the lower the level of attainment at the end of the key stage.
- Among pupils with no missed sessions over KS2, 83.9% achieved the expected standard compared to 40.2% of pupils who were persistently absent.

Cubs & Tigers

The Nursery children had great fun exploring the lifecycle of a caterpillar and we finally released the butterflies into the wild just before half term. The children really enjoy exploring the outdoor environment making mud pies and looking for minibeasts, and this half term we will be spending as much time as we can in our dedicated Woody Wonder area looking for other kinds of insects. We are going to kickstart this week finding out about how honey is made and having a taste too.



Lions

We were amazed by the Lions during sports day at the end of last half term. They were so grown up and listened carefully to all the instructions. They were not fazed at all by the number of people on the field. I loved seeing them race with such confidence, supporting each other and happy to take part. They were a real credit to the school. With the weather warming up we have also been very busy planting beans and searching for signs of summer.

We have just started our 'around the world' topic. Over the next half term, the children will go on a journey, starting in England (at the seaside) and continuing around the world based on the children's interests. We have been busy making a role play area plane so we can fly off to all these destinations. We have started to receive postcards that we are adding to our class map.



Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs have started the term full of energy and raring to go! This half term we are learning about our local area. In geography this is looking at our school environment in the first instance and then thinking about Chulmleigh. The children have already started looking at maps and wrote a key to match an aerial view of our classroom.

Science is also linked to our local area and we are learning the names of local plants and trees. On Monday we went on a walk around the school grounds to spot the differences and similarities between plants, trees and flowers. In maths we are learning about numbers from 50-100 and the children are already doing really well with them.

We are having a really big focus on writing this half term and making sure that we form our letters correctly, sit them on the lines and generally take care to make sure we are always doing our best. We are also doing plenty of phonics and reading practice this half term to ensure we are the best readers we can be before moving up to year 2 next year. A big thank you to all our parents/carers for all the reading you are doing at home with our children.



Dragonflies

We hope that you had a wonderful half term holiday. It has been lovely to read about the experiences and activities that the children have taken part in over the holiday.

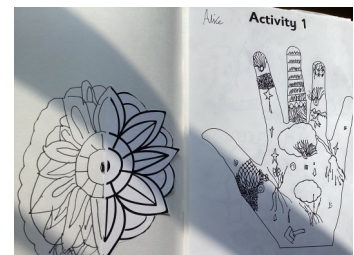
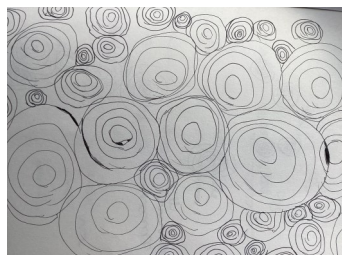
In English, we have just started a unit of writing using 'The Slime Book' as a text. We all know that children love slime, so we are using this text to learn about the features of good instruction writing and the children will end the unit by making their own slime!

In Maths we are continuing with our learning about fractions and capacity. We are also continuing to recap knowledge linked to addition, subtraction, division and times tables.

In art, the children have enjoyed looking at patterns and how they are used in art. They have looked at how designers use pattern and created their own patterns. We have used the terms monochromatic and chromatic to discuss their designs. The children have produced some brilliant artwork and have enjoyed experimenting using different techniques.

We are looking forward to our next class trip, this is planned for Thursday July 18th. We are heading to Northam Burrows where we will be spending time rock-pooling, exploring mini-beasts in the sand dunes and we will also spend time with the RNLI for a beach safety demonstration.

Barn Owls

Barn Owls have had a fantastic start to this new half term. We have a new topic "A journey through America" – we have already been learning some of the 50 states of America by using compass directions to work out where each state is. We have been having great fun learning limericks and practising the rhythms within a limerick. We have started our Oracy project to support us with whole class discussions and how we actively listen to each other speaking. In Maths, we are carrying on with time and learning about months, days and years. We love brain breaks in Barn Owls! We are all trying hard to get back in to Spelling Frame and TTRockstars at home.



Bumblebees

We have been learning all about money in maths. We have looked at converting between pounds and pence and starting to make connections between our learning about decimals and how we write money as pounds and pence. In English, we have started reading extracts from our new book "I'm Not A Label". We have looked at the life of Stephen Hawking closely and learning how he persevered despite his disease which meant he couldn't speak or walk. For World Ocean Day, we have been thinking about why oceans are important and learning more about them. We have started to think about life being a journey in RE. We will learn what life events religious people choose to celebrate.

For our music lessons, we have started to learn some music ready for our performance of The Leopard and the Drum. We are going to be performing this to parents on Thursday 4th July at 6pm (more on this closer to the time). There will be some speaking parts, some singing parts and some dancing parts. Before half term, the children collected Dojo points for great learning or behaviour and earned enough for a special afternoon in school on the Friday. We are going to aim for 4,500 Dojos to do something special at the end of term. I have included some pictures of Sports Day. We saw so many examples of great teamwork so a huge well done to all the children.

Stoats & Squirrels

Year 5 have returned from their half term break ready to begin the new topic "The Amazon Basin". This geography unit of work links together with our new class reader "The Explorer" by Katherine Rundell, and our Computing work where the children will be collecting data and creating different ways of presenting it.

In Maths, the children are continuing to add and subtract decimals with the same, and different numbers of decimal places. They have been thinking about the most efficient ways for them to work out different calculations, whether this be mentally, using a number line or using formal written method, like column. Next week will be our last week focussing on this before we move on to negative numbers.

Our Science work this term fits in with PSHE – looking at humans and how they change from conception through to old age.

You may have seen on Facebook that Year 5 presented work for the Chulmleigh Parish Council meeting just before half term. The booklets are of a very high standard and included sections on Chulmleigh itself, Chulmleigh Old Fair and of course all that the Primary school offers. Children used a range of ways of presentation, including a high standard of Art, Design and writing. The books will be displayed in our entrance hall – well done to everyone in Year 5!

Otters

For Year 6 it is all about the residential to Rock and Rapids! They have had an amazing time and challenged themselves.

From paddle boarding, canoeing and raft building along with high ropes, low ropes, climbing, bouldering and archery. Some have faced their fears of heights and water and we couldn't have been prouder of them.

They have shown our School Values of Compassion, Ambition and Teamwork over the three days. Working together as a team and even with minimal sleep, they still persevered and represented our school brilliantly!



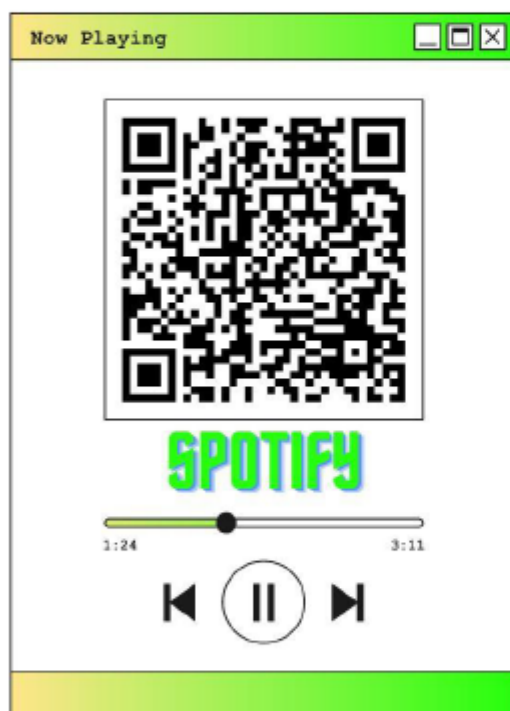

June's Musician of the Month

ARETHA FRANKLIN



About: Aretha Louise Franklin was an American singer, songwriter and pianist. Referred to as the "Queen of Soul", Rolling Stone twice named her as the greatest singer of all time in popular music. As a child, Franklin was noticed for her gospel singing at New Bethel Baptist Church in Detroit, Michigan, where her father C. L. Franklin was a minister. She went on to sell over 75 million records worldwide and received 18 Grammy Awards. From her time growing up in the home of a prominent African-American preacher to the end of her life, Franklin was immersed and involved in the struggle for civil rights and women's rights.

Check if you're eligible for tax-free childcare: The Government-backed Tax-free Childcare scheme eventually gives eligible families 20% off childcare costs. You open an online tax-free Childcare account and the Government adds 30p for every 90p you pay in. You then pay your childcare provider from that account.
