School Improvement Update – trialling numberless problems:

As part of our maths school improvement priority, Upper key stage 2 staff from across our Trust schools have been trialling numberless problems based on research by Given and Strigler (2019). The children have had to apply different calculations and strategies without being given number values. The impact of this approach has led to the children discussing how they would solve the problems based on what information is available without the numbers. Initially, the children found this challenging as it was a different approach. However, they have now asked for more of these wordless challenges and the staff have changed their planning as a result.

Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) Update – Educational Psychology Joint Assessment Meetings (JAMs) for Education Health and Care Needs assessments:

Recently, we have had some educational psychologists observing across the school when undertaking assessments for Education, Health, and Care Needs Assessment (EHCNAs). As part of their visit, the educational psychologists conduct a Joint Assessment Meeting (JAM) with parents, staff from school and maybe other professionals working with the family such as a school nurse, attendance improvement officer or family intervention worker. Devon county council have had feedback that parents and carers do not always have good notice of JAM meetings and are not sure what to expect at these meetings. Starting in February, parents and carers will receive an email from the Educational Psychology Service inviting them to attend the JAM meeting. The email will tell parents and carers what they can expect from the meeting and how they might like to prepare.

Attendance Updates:

As you know, Chulmleigh Primary and the Academy Trust has an unwavering commitment to improve attendance and punctuality at school as we know what a difference it makes to every child's attainment and progress. As a school, we have the motto 'Make Every Minute Count' in our learning. With attendance, 'Every Day Counts' as the infographic below shows the shocking impact of missing just one day from school, once a fortnight, for the child's 13 years of schooling can have on their whole schooling.

Lions

Our trip to Scribbleton was absolutely amazing. The children had so much fun (and so did the adults shhh!). The children were a credit to the school, being both polite and respectful to others.

Last week, the children were very excited when Donna arrived with the incubator and eggs. The children had lots of questions and are looking forward to observing the eggs over the next three weeks. We will keep you updated.

This week we celebrated Pancake Day by eating some yummy pancakes. We also enjoyed pancake races outside and counted how many pancake flips we could do in 30 seconds!

The children have enjoyed the glorious sunshine this week, making full use of all the different outdoor activities. We also used pastels to create some observational pictures of daffodils.



Hedgehogs

It's been another busy couple of weeks for Year 1!

World book day was another success, and the children enjoyed their visit from the author, Anne Parson. Alongside this, the children were lucky enough to have the Bookery visit, where we got to listen to extracts from the top-rated books! We've also had another library visit, and we've chosen some books to bring back to class to enjoy.

In Phonics, we are continuing to recap the sounds new have learnt, as well as continue to learn to read, and spell, the Year 1 Common Exception words. The children are also continuing to write a dictated sentence in these lessons, which enables them to apply their phonetic knowledge. The children are working super hard at keeping their writing lovely and neat.

In English, we are still reading 'Daisy Doodles'. We've looked at the different emotions that Daisy may be feeling throughout the story. We are focussing more on using 'and' in our sentences. However, we have to be careful not to put in too many, or we will run out of breath!

We are still looking at numbers to 50 in Maths. We've been thinking about missing numbers on a number line and how we know what they are. The children are getting great at remembering that the first numeral represents the tens, and the second numeral represents the ones. We've also been learning about the word 'partition', and how we can split these 2-digit numbers into their tens and ones.

Dragonflies

In Year 2, we have started our History learning linked to Castles and life in the past. We are looking forward to our visit to Tiverton Castle. This is one of the oldest castles in the county, first built in 1106. We will learn about the people who used to live there - including the first Norman Earls of Devon, the de Redvers family from 1106 and the Courtenays - one of whom married Princess Katherine of York who was Henry VIII's favourite aunt. The children are invited to dress up for our visit, although please do not feel you need to purchase any dressing up items; this could just be a homemade crown with a cloak.

In science, we have started a new topic linked to animals and their habitats. We will examine microhabitats and larger habitats and identify some animals that may live there. Children will then investigate to see which conditions woodlice prefer in their habitat. After that, they will examine how living things adapt to their environment. Finally, they will examine food chains within habitats.

In maths, we are coming to the end of our learning linked to money. Following this we will move on to multiplication and division.

In DT, we have been looking at where different fruit and vegetables grow. The children knew lots about apple orchards!

In Science, the children have been looking at the different bones in the human body. We are moving on to how we can group animals into mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians



Barn Owls

We have had a busy start to the half term in Barn Owls with some new topics and the annual event of World Book Day. The children have loved the WBD celebrations so far – and it has given us a chance to share and enjoy a range of different authors. They loved the visit from The Bookery from Crediton and listened so well. Their own Book reviews have been well written.

The children will be learning about Plants, and growing and sowing in Science with Mrs. Leslie on Thursdays and Fridays. We are extending some of our science learning from last term in English by focusing on non-fiction texts, including one on Rocks. We are learning about the different style of writing in non-fiction, compared with our story writing from recently, and later we shall be writing our own non-fiction piece on fossils.

We are continuing our History topic on the Romans in Britain: we have linked it with some Geography skills as the children have been designing their own Roman town based on the grid system, and they have been really fascinated by the development of the Roman Road network in our country still today. They have learnt that Exeter was named “Isca Dumnoniorum” and several children have shared visits to Roman cities such as Bath.

The weather has been fabulous and it has meant breaktimes outside have been very enjoyable. Our new PE topic is Tri-golf, which they are loving, and we shall be looking forward to our turn for 3 weeks of cricket later this term.

Bumblebees

Bumble bees have been busy practising their times tables, this week we have focused on our 12 x tables, as our score on this was lower than some of the others. In maths we have been learning about fractions, proper and improper fractions and converting mixed numbers to improper fractions.

In English we have enjoyed our new book “Until I met Dudley” and are enjoying coming up with our own explanations for how things work.

In Science we are learning about liquids and gases.

Our Topic is Italy and volcanoes and we have enjoyed sharing photos and finding out about why volcanoes exist. In French we are learning the French words for members of our families. In PE we really enjoyed cricket on Friday, we are still learning how to work as a team and be supportive of each other, but it's safe to say the children were buzzing by the end of the session!



Squirrels

Squirrels have been super busy, as ever. We are currently researching facts to write a persuasive letter about an endangered animal. The children will be choosing who to send it off to signed Squirrels class e.g. our MP, the Prime Minister, David Attenborough etc. We have looked at using modal verbs to help us and how to create emotion with noun phrases. As well as reading and writing, we have been finishing our unit on multiplication and division. We have started learning about short division and long multiplication. This week, we have also talked about which method is the most efficient to use for a calculation.

In addition to swimming, we have been enjoying the extra cricket sessions on a Friday afternoon. In PSHE, we have been thinking about how some drugs are medicines and some, like tobacco, are harmful. We have started our science unit on forces by labelling pushes and pulls and starting to think about different types of forces. The highlights of this week have been the visit by the Bookery when we selected our books and World Book Day. We have loved sharing our favourite books as part of World Book Day. Lastly, a massive congratulations to all the children who took part in the gymnastic competition and well done on getting your certificates.



Otters & Foxes

Otters and Foxes have had a fantastic couple of weeks back after half term. In English, we have been learning about Ernest Shackleton and finding out facts to create a biography. We have also been revising our spelling, our punctuation and our grammar whenever we speak. Try asking your child to convert a sentence from the present tense to the past tense....maybe using some irregular verbs and possibly adding in some modal verbs – we love a challenge in Year 6!

In Maths we have been using decimals and multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000. Year 6 have enjoyed problem solving and using their mathematical language with decimals. They are also trying hard to speak in full sentences when talking about Maths to explain what they have noticed.

Both classes have had a challenge to build the best type of boat out of tinfoil – it has been interesting watching the results. Thank you so much to the PTA for supporting our World Book Day. We absolutely loved our visit from The Bookery – it is always really exciting to see new books and get to listen to extracts and be inspired by reading.
